

Dear Friends,

To be honest I'm not quite sure what to write. We are coming to the end of another Lent, the world is still experiencing conflict and tragedy, people are still hurting, hunger is still a reality for so many people and in our own Benefice of New Windsor, there's plenty of hidden pain and human struggle waiting to be tended to in places such as The Windsor Homeless Project and Foodshare. What can be written when this cycle of chaos continues? The cost-of-living crisis, the war in the Ukraine, the earthquake in Turkey and Syria? I wonder if this is what it means to be in the desert? The symbolism of Jesus' forty days in the

desert, like the forty years of the chosen people, brings to heart and mind the challenge of responding to the Sacred when all around us all we see is desert and dunes. Little shade, no oasis but an inkling, an intimation, we are being called to move forward, to move evermore deeply into the mystery of the divine.

As a priest and therapist, I am becoming accustomed to the reality of 'unknowing.' In the life of my clients, we have been unsure where the therapy will take us, or what will happen if an important change is created. As a priest I recognise that my ideas about the reality we call God are slipping through my fingers like the desert sands. And yet this is not a cause of anxiety or fear, for I experience my journey into 'unknowing' and the mystery of God as an expansion of vision, an expansion of what we call faith. It is also a call to trust, to trust the process of being in relationships whilst not knowing what will happen in the future. And yet, how easy is it to trust a process that doesn't seem to have a clear ending? I wonder if that

reflects the whole story of going into the desert with Christ at Lent. We follow, but do not know the outcome, however, something happens to us on the way. By being with this man who is full of divinity, the One who is the face of God's compassion, we begin to create something new, but we have to do it in the desert, in the place where we are not in control.

When we experience loss, grief, a lack of connection in life or the toxicity of others, as well as the mystery of death in life, we experience a disquieting in the norm of our lives, and we are reminded ever so clearly, and painfully, we are not in charge of life. We are being led forth by The One who is the source of life and relationship, our response or lack of it will shape the contact point of God's life and our own.

As Lent will lean into Easter we will celebrate another extraordinary mystery. The desert will give way to the empty tomb and the trembling faith of those confused followers will eventually turn to joy. We are approaching the central mystery of our faith, the journey that we call life with God. It is difficult to understand what that actually means, but that's ok, I don't think we're meant to know. All that we are asked is "follow" and "trust." This is the way that leads to transformation, where endings and beginning merge, where old ways give ground to new ways of living. The resurrection of Jesus is our power to bring life out of death, this is

the way God relates to us. Our struggles, our pain, our losses are the gold that God will use to make us shine.





As we approach Easter, I have chosen a poem that was submitted some years ago by Anne Carter (a member of Holy Trinity congregation) who died a few months ago. Anne found the poem in a book called "Living Belief" written by the theologian John Barton, which was based on Lent lectures that he gave to clergy in the Winchester Diocese in 1994.

Anne said that she liked the way the poet used the natural world to give an almost luminous meaning to the night.

The poem is medieval, written in Latin by an Irishman, Sedulius Scottus, who was driven from his native shores by Norse invaders during the mid-ninth century. It was translated from the original Latin by Helen Waddell.

#### Holy Week and Easter across our Team

Holy Week begins on Palm Sunday which this year is 2<sup>nd</sup> April. There are services every day during the week from Palm Sunday to Easter Day. "Holy" means "set apart". So, Holy Week is a week which is set apart from the other 51 weeks of the year. It is set apart to enable us to experience more fully the events leading up to the crucifixion of Christ so that, through experiencing them, we are better able to enter into the full joy of the resurrection. It is difficult to experience the full joy of Easter morning without experiencing what comes before.

All our services for Holy Week are listed on the front page of this magazine. The traditional name for the three days leading up to Easter Day is the Triduum. During this period and on Easter Day itself, you may wish to note the following services across our four churches:

On Maundy Thursday (6th April) we have Sung Eucharist of the Last Supper followed by (optional) Watch of the Passion at St Stephen & St Agnes, Vansittart Road, beginning at 7.30pm.

On Good Friday (7<sup>th</sup> April) at the Parish Church of St John the Baptist, our Three Hours Devotion begins at 12 noon with an hour of cello, organ and sung music for Passiontide. The Second Hour, beginning at 1pm will include readings from Stephen Cottrell's The Nail taking us to 2pm when the Third Hour, Liturgy of the Cross, begins. The congregation is welcome to stay for the full three hours or to come and go throughout.

We have a service in each of our four churches on Easter Day, beginning at St Stephen & St Agnes Church with the First Eucharist of Easter (Dawn Eucharist) at 6am. This atmospheric service is a wonderful way to begin

Easter Day and well worth the early start (especially as breakfast is served afterwards!). In addition, there is a traditional Holy Communion according to the Book of Common Prayer (BCP) at Holy Trinity Church at 8am; a Family Eucharist with traditional Easter hymns at All Saints' Church, Frances Road at 10am and Easter Praise followed by Communion at St John the Baptist, Windsor Parish Church at 11.15am. Please join us if you can!

#### **Annual Meetings**

The annual meetings in our three parishes are in April and May (they have to be held by the end of May each year). Firstly if you're not already on the electoral roll, please consider joining by completing in a form in one of the churches or you can download a copy from the Diocese of Oxford website. You can be on more than one church electoral roll but can only be elected to a role (office) in one specific parish. Being on the electoral roll gives you an opportunity to get more involved in church life - you could be elected as a churchwarden, to the PCC or, this year, as your parish's Deanery Synod Representative or nominate/ elect someone. Parochial Church Councils are a group of people who between them all have a broad range of skills and experience. They act as trustees and support the rector, in promoting the mission of the church and overseeing the maintenance and repair of parish building(s) and contents.

Our Annual Meetings consist of two separate meetings which will be held on the same day.

The meeting to elect churchwardens is normally held first and can be attended by anyone on the church electoral roll or resident in the parish (ie on the government electoral roll of the parish). Churchwardens, with the clergy, are responsible for the day-today running of the parish. You can find out more about the role, including a

short film by Bishop Steven (Bishop of Oxford) on the <u>diocesan website</u>. Nominations for churchwarden must be received by the Rector prior to the meeting (<u>form here</u>).

The Annual Parochial Church Meeting usually follows the election of the wardens and can be attended by anyone on the church electoral roll. At this meeting attendees consider reports on the church's finances and fabric and receive other reports. The new Parochial Church Council is either entirely or partially elected (if the parish has previously agreed that not all the current members retire every year). If you are interested and would like to know more, please do have a chat with one of the wardens or Revd Sally. You can also get a general overview about being a PCC member on the diocesan website.

A short meeting of the PCC follows the APCM where members elect the Vicechair, Treasurer, Secretary and

others. All three meetings usually take less than an hour so you'll be home in time for lunch!

#### This month it was...

150 years ago, on 4<sup>th</sup> April 1873 that the Kennel Club was founded in London. It oversees dog shows and dog agility competitions and operates Britain's national register of pedigree dogs. The Kennel Club licenses dog shows throughout the UK, but the only dog show that it actually runs is Crufts. The Kennel Club recognises 221 breeds, of which the Labrador Retriever is probably most popular.

100 years ago, on 15<sup>th</sup> April 1923 that insulin became generally available for the treatment of diabetes.

Also 100 years ago, on 26<sup>th</sup> April 1923 that Prince Albert, Duke of York (later King George VI) married Lady Elizabeth Bowes-Lyon (later Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother) at Westminster Abbey in London.

90 years ago, on 3<sup>rd</sup> April 1933 that the first flight over Mount Everest took place. British pilots the Marquis of

Clydesdale and Donald McIntyre flew two biplanes over the summit.

8o years ago, from 20<sup>th</sup> April to 13<sup>th</sup> May 1943 that the final phase of World War 2's Tunisia campaign took place. An Allied victory, and the Axis forces were ejected from North Africa.

Also 80 years ago, on 30<sup>th</sup> April 1943 that the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp was established in Germany. The former prisoner-of-war camp was converted into a holding camp, mainly for Jews. Tens of thousands of people died of starvation and disease in the overcrowded, unsanitary conditions.

75 years ago, on 7<sup>th</sup> April 1948 that the World Health Organization (WHO) was founded in Geneva, Switzerland as a specialist agency of the United Nations.

Also 75 years ago, on 30<sup>th</sup> April 1948 that the Land Rover, a British all-terrain vehicle, was officially launched at the Amsterdam Motor Show. According to Yougov.co.uk, nowadays 95% of us

have heard of them, and 58% of us admire them.

70 years ago, on 16<sup>th</sup> April 1953 that Queen Elizabeth II launched the Royal Yacht Britannia. It was decommissioned in 1997. The Royal Family no longer owns a royal yacht.

60 years ago, on 16<sup>th</sup> April 1963 that American civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jnr. wrote his famous 'Letter from Birmingham Jail' while imprisoned in Alabama. He stated that the Black community was forced to protest when the white power structure left them no choice.

50 years ago, on 4<sup>th</sup> April 1973 that the World Trade Centre in New York City was officially opened. It was destroyed in the 9/11 terrorist attacks in 2001.

Also 50 years ago, on 8<sup>th</sup> April 1973 that Pablo Picasso, Spanish artist died. Cofounder of the Cubism movement, he is considered one of the greatest artists of the 20<sup>th</sup> century.

40 years ago, on 1st April 1983 that tens of thousands of anti-nuclear weapons protestors formed a 14-mile human chain in Berkshire. They linked the US airbase at Greenham Common, the nuclear research centre in Aldermaston, and an ordnance factory in Burghfield.

40 years ago, on 15<sup>th</sup> April 1983 that Corrie ten Boom, a Dutch writer and Holocaust survivor, died. She wrote about her experiences in Christian books that became best-sellers. 30 years ago, on 22<sup>nd</sup> April 1993 that Stephen Lawrence, an 18-year-old British teenager, was murdered in a racially motivated attack while waiting for a bus in Eltham, London. The highprofile case was widely covered by the media, and an inquiry found that the Metropolitan Police Service, which originally investigated the crime, was institutionally racist.

30 years ago, on 29<sup>th</sup> April 1993 that Queen Elizabeth II announced that Buckingham Palace would open to the public for the first time, to raise funds to repair fire damage at Windsor Castle.

Also 30 years ago, on 30<sup>th</sup> April 1993 that CERN, the creators of the World Wide Web, announced that it could be used for free by anyone. That decision has shaped the modern world as we know it.

25 years ago, on 10<sup>th</sup> April 1998 that the Good Friday Agreement was signed in Northern Ireland.

20 years ago, on 9<sup>th</sup> April 2003 that US troops took control of Iraq's capital city, Baghdad. Jubilant Iraqis celebrated the end of Saddam Hussein's regime.

Also 20 years ago, on 14<sup>th</sup> April 2003 that the Human Genome Project was successfully completed, with over 99% of the human genome sequenced and mapped, including all of the genes.



#### The Passionflower

This beautiful climbing plant that grows in many of our gardens, usually flowering from July to October, was discovered in South America by Spanish missionaries centuries ago. Drawings were sent back to Europe and in 1609 an Italian priest interpreted the flower to represent the crucifixion, otherwise known as the Passion.

The five petals and five sepals represent the 10 disciples who remained steadfast (Judas and Peter both abandoned Jesus). The corona is the crown of thorns. The stigma is the cross or nails, and the five stamens are the number of wounds Jesus received.
