

Stations of the Cross



St Stephen & St Agnes Church
Windsor

The Stations of the Cross have formed part of Christian devotion at Passiontide for many centuries because they enable us to engage actively with the path of suffering walked by Jesus. They originated when early Christians visited Jerusalem and wanted to follow literally in the footsteps of Jesus, tracing the path from Pilate's house to Calvary. They would pause for prayer and devotion at various points. Eventually those pilgrims brought the practice back to their home countries and ever since then Christians of differing traditions have used this form of devotion.

The Stations of the Cross in St Stephen & St Agnes Church do not include Stations VI (Veronica wipes the face of Jesus) and IX (Jesus falls for the third time) which are sometimes included in other settings. If you wish to use these Stations as part of your devotions, appropriate readings and prayers can be found at the end of this booklet.

The service is introduced

Jesus told his disciples, 'If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it.' *Matthew 16.24,25*

Almighty God,
give us grace to follow in heart and mind
the way of our Lord to Calvary.
May we meditate on this most terrible
and most wonderful mystery
in sorrow for our sins
and thankfulness for the love
that redeemed us in those hours of suffering.
May we be blessed as we begin this holy devotion.

Station I: Jesus is condemned to death

We adore you O Christ and
we bless you.

**All Because by your holy
cross you have
redeemed the world.**

Reading: *Matthew 27:22-26*

Pilate said to them, 'Then what should I do with Jesus who is called the Messiah?' All of them said, 'Let him be crucified!'

Then he asked, 'Why, what evil has he done?' But they shouted all the more, 'Let him be crucified!'

So when Pilate saw that he could do nothing, but rather that a riot was beginning, he took some water and washed his hands before the crowd, saying,

'I am innocent of this man's blood; see to it yourselves.'

Then the people as a whole answered, 'His blood be on us and on our children!' So he released Barabbas for them; and after flogging Jesus, he handed him over to be crucified.



Prayer

Lord Jesus, we pray for all who administer justice and seek to uphold the rule of law. We pray for prisoners, for victims of injustice, for the falsely imprisoned and for all who fight for the needs of the oppressed. Give us hearts of compassion and courage to defend the innocent.

Station II: Jesus takes up his cross

We adore you O Christ and
we bless you.

**All Because by your holy
cross you have redeemed
the world.**

Reading: *John 19: 16-17;*
Isaiah 53: 5

So they took Jesus; and
carrying the cross by
himself, he went out to
what is called The Place of
the Skull, which in Hebrew
is called Golgotha.

But he was wounded for
our transgressions,
crushed for our iniquities;
upon him was the
punishment that made us
whole, and by his bruises
we are healed.

Prayer

We pray that we might hear afresh our call from God, and give
ourselves in his service. May we have the courage to accept all
the trial and difficulties of our earthly pilgrimage.

We pray that nations and individuals may have the grace to be
forgiving in their relationships, so that God's will may be done.
Lord, help us to take up our cross and follow you.

Station III: Jesus falls for the first time

We adore you O Christ and
we bless you.

**All Because by your holy
cross you have redeemed
the world.**

Reading: *John 12.23-25*

Jesus answered them, 'The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life.

Prayer

We pray for all who feel
overburdened or who
struggle with life.

We pray for the chronically sick, the depressed,
and those who feel weighed down by anxiety,
stress or concern for those whom they love.
May we have the strength to offer support and care.

Lord in your mercy

Station IV: Jesus meets his mother

We adore you O Christ and
we bless you.

**All Because by your holy
cross you have redeemed
the world.**

Reading: *Luke 2: 34-35*

Then Simeon blessed them
and said to his mother
Mary, 'This child is destined
for the falling and the rising
of many in Israel, and to be
a sign that will be opposed
so that the inner thoughts
of many will be revealed—
and a sword will pierce
your own soul too.'

Prayer

Lord Jesus, we pray for
parents whose children
suffer through illness,
for parents whose children
are missing, for those who
are parted from their children through
war or natural disasters.
Enfold them in your love and care.

Lord in your mercy

All hear our prayer.



Station V: Simon of Cyrene

We adore you O Christ and
we bless you.

**All Because by your holy
cross you have redeemed
the world.**

Reading: *Luke 23: 26*

As they led him away, they
seized a man, Simon of
Cyrene, who was coming
from the country, and they
laid the cross on him, and
made him carry it behind
Jesus.

Prayer

We pray for all who are
struggling with their faith,
for those wracked by
doubt, for those who have
turned away from church
life and those whose faith
has grown cold.
May the healing, forgiving
love of Christ bring them back.
Lord, stir up the gift of faith in us.

Station VII: Jesus falls for the second time

We adore you O Christ and
we bless you.

All **Because by your holy
cross you have redeemed
the world.**

Reading: *Mark 14.34-36*

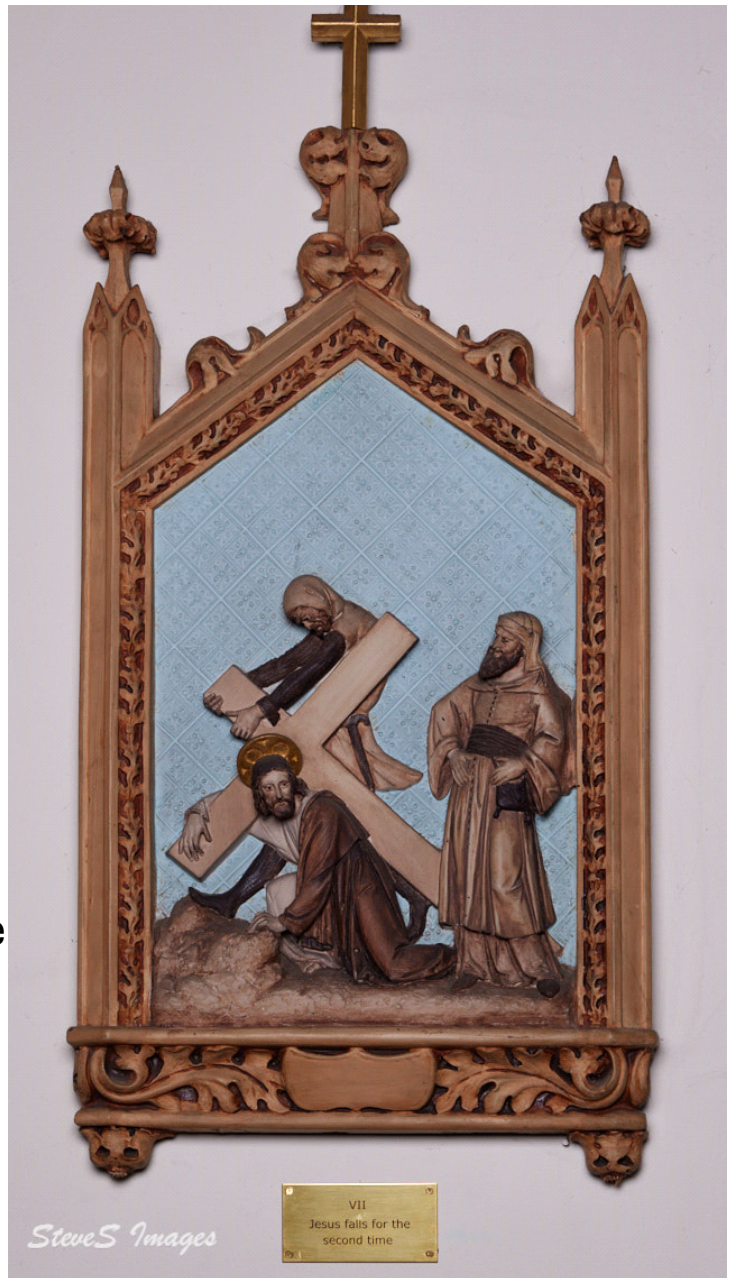
Jesus said to them, 'I am deeply grieved, even to death; remain here, and keep awake.' And going a little farther, he threw himself on the ground and prayed that, if it were possible, the hour might pass from him. He said, 'Abba, Father, for you all things are possible; remove this cup from me; yet, not what I want, but what you want.'

Prayer

We pray for all those who despair through circumstances over which they have no control. We pray for all who have fallen into destitution and despair: the homeless and the stateless, the unemployed and the un-empowered. Lift our eyes so that we may see more clearly the needs of your people. We thank you that each time we fall or fail or fear, your love and mercy lift us up.

Station VIII: Jesus speaks to the women of Jerusalem

We adore you O Christ and we bless you.

All Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Reading: *Luke 23: 27-29*

A great number of the people followed him, and among them were women who were beating their breasts and wailing for him. But Jesus turned to them and said, 'Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me, but weep for yourselves and for your children. For the days are surely coming when they will say, "Blessed are the barren, and the wombs that never bore, and the breasts that never nursed."

Prayer

Lord Jesus, the women of Jerusalem wept for you: move us to tears at the plight of the broken in our world. You embraced the pain of Jerusalem, the "city of peace": bless Jerusalem this day and lead it to the path of profound peace.

Station X: Jesus is stripped of his garments

We adore you O Christ and we bless you.

All Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Reading: *John 19: 23-24*

When the soldiers had crucified Jesus, they took his clothes and divided them into four parts, one for each soldier. They also took his tunic; now the tunic was seamless, woven in one piece from the top. So they said to one another, 'Let us not tear it, but cast lots for it to see who will get it.' This was to fulfil what the scripture says, 'They divided my clothes among themselves, and for my clothing they cast lots.'



Prayer

We pray for all who have nothing. We pray for those who hunger or thirst; for those whom society has neglected and abandoned. We pray for those who whilst materially rich are poor in spirit. Help us Lord to value those things which really matter.

Station XI: Jesus is nailed to the cross

We adore you O Christ and
we bless you.

All **Because by your holy
cross you have
redeemed the world.**

Reading: *Mark 15: 25-27*

It was nine o'clock in the
morning when they
crucified him.
The inscription of the
charge against him read,
'The King of the Jews.'
And with him they
crucified two bandits,
one on his right and one
on his left.

Prayer

We pray for the dying and
for those who care for
them, for those who work
in hospices and all who
seek to relieve the
suffering of the dying.
We pray for those who
find no joy in being alive.
May they find hope in you
Lord Christ for your love
is stronger than death.

Station XII: Jesus dies on the cross

We adore you O Christ and
we bless you.

**All Because by your holy
cross you have
redeemed the world.**

Reading: *Mark 15: 33-37*

When it was noon,
darkness came over the
whole land until three in
the afternoon. At three
o'clock Jesus cried out
with a loud voice, 'Eloi,
Eloi, lema sabachthani?'
which means, 'My God,
my God, why have you
forsaken me?' When
some of the bystanders
heard it, they said,
'Listen, he is calling for
Elijah.' And someone ran,
filled a sponge with sour
wine, put it on a stick,
and gave it to him to
drink, saying, 'Wait, let us
see whether Elijah will
come to take him down.'
Then Jesus gave a loud cry and breathed his last.

Station XIII: Jesus is taken down from the cross

We adore you O Christ and we bless you.

All Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Reading: *John 19: 38*

After these things, Joseph of Arimathea, who was a disciple of Jesus, though a secret one because of his fear of the Jews, asked Pilate to let him take away the body of Jesus. Pilate gave him permission; so he came and removed his body.

Prayer

Lord Jesus, we pray for all who live in darkness and despair;
for all who fear that death is the end;
for all who dare not hope.
We pray for all those who bring dignity to death and comfort the bereaved.
Lord, take all whom you have called from this world, into your eternal light and peace.

Station XIV: Jesus is laid in the tomb

We adore you O Christ and
we bless you.

**All Because by your holy
cross you have
redeemed the world.**

Reading: *John 19.39-42*

Nicodemus, who had at first come to Jesus by night, also came, bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes, weighing about a hundred pounds. They took the body of Jesus and wrapped it with the spices in linen cloths, according to the burial custom of the Jews. Now there was a garden in the place where he was crucified, and in the garden there was a new tomb in which no one had ever been laid. And so, because it was the Jewish day of Preparation, and the tomb was nearby, they laid Jesus there.



Prayers

Lord Jesus, we pray for all the baptised people of God and for those who are preparing for baptism. Since in baptism we have shared Christ's death in order to share his risen life, so through us may the word of God be alive and active today.

Lord in your mercy
All **hear our prayer.**
Christ became obedient for us unto death.
All **Even the death of the Cross.**
Let us bless the Lord.
All **Thanks be to God.**

Almighty God, grant to us,
who have followed our Lord
through the time of his most holy Passion,
the inward sight to face the reality of divine suffering.
May the power of the Cross be our shield
against all evil in this world,
our comfort in the hour of death,
and our way to eternal life.
We pray in the name of Jesus Christ,
who died upon the cross,
that we might live in him.

All **Amen**

Station VI: Veronica wipes the face of Jesus

We adore you O Christ and we bless you

All Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world

Reading: *Matthew 25:34-37,40*

Then the king will say to those at his right hand, "Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me." Then the righteous will answer him, "Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? And the king will answer them, "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me."

Prayer

Lord Jesus we pray for all who bring comfort and care to others. We pray for those in the medical profession, for those who sit with the dying and those who offer spiritual care to the sick. May they come to see that in serving others, it is you whom they serve.

Station IX: Jesus falls for the third time

We adore you O Christ and we bless you

All Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world

Reading: *John 15:18-20*

Jesus said, 'If the world hates you, be aware that it hated me before it hated you. If you belonged to the world, the world would love you as its own. Because you do not belong to the world, but I have chosen you out of the world—therefore the world hates you. Remember the word that I said to you, "Servants are not greater than their master." If they persecuted me, they will persecute you; if they kept my word, they will keep yours also.

Prayer

Lord Jesus, we pray for all who are downtrodden and for those who have lost the will to carry on. We pray for refugees, for victims of prejudice and for all who are deprived of rights or freedom. May they know that in your eyes they are of infinite worth.
